




The Novelist's Lexicon: Writers on the Words That Define Their Work

Originally published in France in 2008, this book collects more than 70 defining essays from the writers who attended the International Forum of the Novel, hosted by Le Monde and Villa Gillet in Lyon. Each writer was asked to choose a word that opens a door to his work, and their collected musings offer an extraordinary portrait of writing and reading from the novelist's perspective, from Rick Moody discussing adumbrated and Colum McCann exploring anonymity to Jonathan Lethem on furniture, Wei Wei on happiness, Annie Proulx on terroir, and Péter Esterházy on words, words, words."These authors represent an impressive range of nationalities.
